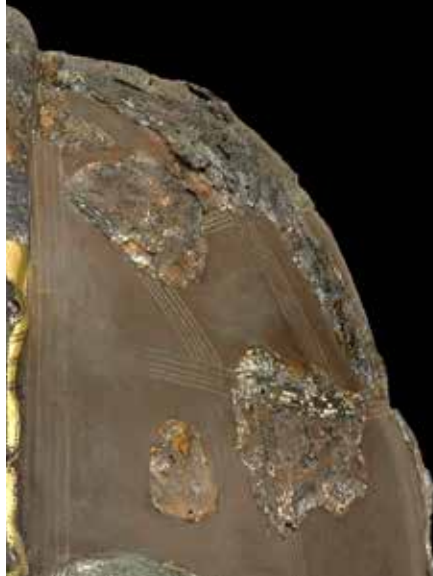

How to book a place

All applications and workshop selections for the 2018 July Conference in Leeds will be processed online. Please note the following to ensure easy booking, payment and workshop selection.

- For information about the conference and to book a place just go to **schoolshistoryproject.co.uk** and click on the SHP Summer Conference.
- You can only book one delegate per visit to the store. Please feel free to make more than one booking per school.
 - If you return to the store to make payment online you will be able to make several payments (if applicable) in the one visit, as long as you have the unique invoice numbers.
 - You will need to have the unique number on hand to make payment online, or make your workshop bookings.
- Once you have made the initial booking you will receive two emails by return; the first is an acknowledgement of booking and the second contains the invoice.
- It is free to make your booking, but the booking will not be confirmed until the conference payment is received.
- **If payment is to be made by a third party ie your school, please ensure that the invoice is passed onto the correct person for payment.**
- Please ensure that you follow the payment instructions contained within the emailed invoice; Payment can be made online (preferable), through the Bank (BACS) or by cheque – ensuring you include the invoice number in all circumstances
